## Preparations underway for your safety

Friends, even though our first in-person worship service will be held outside, we need to maintain our commitment to keep everyone healthy and well.

Currently, the Executive Order from the Governor continues to limit indoor gatherings to 25 people and outdoor gatherings to 50 people. Maybe this will change later this month. As much as we might not want to, we can do our part to reduce the spread of COVID-19 by practicing social distancing from those outside of their own household or family group, wearing face coverings over your mouth and nose, and washing your hands often.

We'll need to refrain from touching and hugging each other, especially those outside of your own household or family group. I know that will be especially hard since you haven't seen each other in a long time, but we really need to honor this. You'll be asked to use hand sanitizer and avoid touching common areas.

Even outside, worship itself will be modified so that we can keep everyone safe. We'll omit the Sharing of the Peace and passing an offering plate. We ask that you remain with your family group. Baskets will be available for you to drop in your offering when you arrive and as you leave.

Holy Communion will be prepared by those who have sanitized their hands and put on gloves and masks. We'll be using individual cups and separate containers for the wafer which you will pick up yourself.

Based on information from the CDC, the ELCA, and the NC Synod, air quality is of utmost importance when gathering indoors. Because circulating fresh and clean air in the sanctuary and fellowship hall is challenging, we have ordered 3 air purifiers. Two will be placed in the sanctuary and one in the fellowship hall. If we have an event in the fellowship hall, one of the ones upstairs will be moved downstairs. These units will clean the air quickly of dust, pollen, allergens, mold, bacteria, and viruses. These air purifiers are on back order.

At this point we will worship outside again on Sunday, Nov. 1. Once we have everything ready in the sanctuary we'll move inside. Thank you for your patience and understanding. More information will be shared as it becomes available.



## Did you know?

St. Paul is the recipient of a \$4500 Shared Ministry Grant from the NC Synod! This gift has enabled us to purchase the 3 air purifiers, additional filters, and other items we need to safely gather for outdoor and indoor worship.

## **Preaching Series - Philippians**

Every now and then, the Revised Common Lectionary gives us opportunities to focus on specific books of the Bible over several weeks. I like to use these opportunities to go deeper into a particular book. Paul's letter to the believers in Philippi is the current focus.

A little history on this letter. Paul wrote this letter while he was under house arrest in Rome. He had already established the church in Philippi and, according to Acts of the Apostles, he visited it often. The believers in Philippi were concerned about Paul so they sent Epaphroditus to bring a gift and check on him. Epaphroditus remained with Paul for a while and then returned to Philippi with the thankful and happy letter we call Philippians.

This is a short letter, with only 4 chapters. Each one is full of encouragement as Paul reminds the believers to be steadfast in their faith.

On Sunday, Sept. 27, we looked at the themes in chapter 1: relationships, prayer, perspective, and unity. It is important to Paul that the church in Philippi remain focus on the things that he has taught them. He longs for their lives be woven together in fellowship and grounded in prayer so that they can persevere in suffering and live in the unity of the Spirit.

These are important themes for us as we live in this prolonged time of anxiety and separation. Remember to reach out to each other, hold one another in prayer, ask for what you need, and make plans to participate in our first in-person worship service in a long time.

We'll continue going deeper into this letter over the next several weeks: October 4 – chapter 2; Oct. 11 – chapter 3; and Oct. 18 – chapter 4
